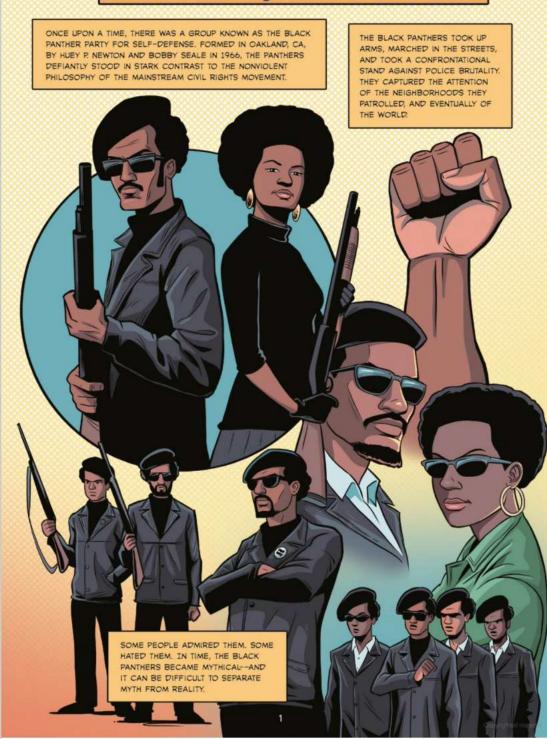
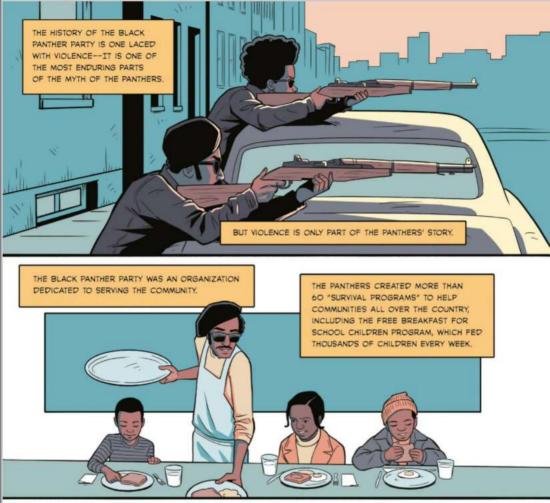

TWO — Before the Panthers

IN ORDER TO UNDERSTAND HOW AN ORGANIZATION LIKE THE BLACK PANTHER PARTY COULD COME INTO EXISTENCE, IT IS IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND THE HISTORY OF OPPRESSION AND THE STRUGGLE FOR FREEDOM ENDURED BY AFRICANS AND THEIR DESCENDANTS IN AMERICA.

THE FIRST AFRICANS WERE BROUGHT AS SLAVES TO EUROPEAN COLONIES SI CHIEF

IN NORTH AMERICA, SOUTH AMERICA, AND THE CARIBBEAN IN 1525.

IN THE U.S., THE FORCED ENSLAYEMENT OF AFRICANS AND THEIR DESCENDANTS WOULD NOT END UNTIL 1863--AND IT WOULD TAKE A BLOODY WAR BETWEEN THE STATES TO END IT.

DURING THE CIVIL WAR, MORE THAN 100,000 BLACK MEN FOUGHT FOR THE UNION TO ENSURE THE FREEDOM OF MILLIONS MORE HELD IN CAPTIVITY, AND WHILE THEIR FIGHT HELPED BRING FREEDOM, IT DID NOT BRING EQUALITY.



THE LEGACY OF RACIAL OPPRESSION THAT ALLOWED SLAVERY TO FLOURISH IN AMERICA FOR CENTURIES CONTINUED, AS BLACK AMERICANS STRUGGLED AGAINST DISCRIMINATION AND SEGREGATION, LOOKING TO FIND THEIR PLACE IN THE LAND OF THE FREE.

HAVING BEEN SUBJECTED TO CENTURIES OF DEHUMANIZING ATROCITIES LARGELY IN THE SOUTHERN STATES, MANY BLACK AMERICANS BEGAN TO MIGRATE TO THE NORTH AND WEST STARTING IN 1916

KNOWN AS THE GREAT MIGRATION, BLACK AMERICANS FLED THE SOUTH BY THE MILLIONS LOOKING FOR A BETTER WAY OF LIFE, AWAY FROM LEGALIZED SEGREGATION, SHARECROPPING, AND LYNCHING.



LIFE OUTSIDE OF THE SOUTH WAS DIFFERENT IN MANY WAYS, BUT OPPRESSION, INTOLERANCE, AND LIMITED OPPORTUNITY WERE PERVASIVE. DISCRIMINATION IN THE WORKPLACE AND HOUSING PERSISTED. THE THREAT OF VIOLENCE WAS EVERYWHERE.

IN WHAT IS KNOWN AS THE RED SUMMER OF 1919, ANGRY WHITE MOBS INSTIGATED MORE THAN 40 RACIALLY MOTIVATED ATTACKS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY, KILLING HUNDREDS OF BLACK AMERICANS.

THE SENSELESS VIOLENCE AND KILLING OF THE RED SUMMER WAS NOT THE END OF RACIST TERROR IN AMERICA.

IN 1921, ONE YEAR LATER, THE ALL-BLACK COMMUNITY OF GREENWOOD IN TULSA, OK, WAS ATTACKED BY AN ANGRY WHITE MOB AFTER A WHITE WOMAN ACCUSED A BLACK MAN OF ASSAULTING HER. GREENWOOD, WHICH WAS KNOWN AS "BLACK WALL STREET," WAS DESTROYED.





TWO YEARS LATER, THE PREDOMINANTLY BLACK TOWN OF ROSEWOOD, FL, WAS COMPLETELY BURNED TO THE GROUND IN 1923 WHEN A BLACK MAN WAS FALSELY ACCUSED OF ATTACKING A WHITE WOMAN.





BETWEEN 1882 AND 1968, THERE WERE 3,446 RECORDED LYNCHINGS OF BLACK FOLKS IN THE U.S. IN THE EARLY 1900S, LYNCHINGS HAD BECOME A FORM OF PUBLIC ENTERTAINMENT, WITH POSTCARDS CREATED TO COMMEMORATE THE MURDERS.

FOR DECADES, ACTIVISTS AND POLITICIANS FOUGHT FOR ANTI-LYNCHING LEGISLATION, ONLY TO BE STOPPED AT EVERY TURN BY SOUTHERN POLITICIANS.

THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS WOULD NOT PASS ANY FORM OF ANTI-LYNCHING REGULATION UNTIL 2020--MORE THAN A CENTURY AFTER THE RED SUMMER OF 1919.



DISCRIMINATION, OPPRESSION, AND RACIAL VIOLENCE IN THE EARLY 20th CENTURY GAVE RISE TO A CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT THAT SOUGHT SOCIAL AND POLITICAL EQUALITY FOR BLACK AMERICANS.

THIS TIME WOULD SEE THE BIRTH OF ORGANIZATIONS LIKE THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF COLORED PEOPLE (NAACP) AND LEADERS LIKE W. E. B. DU BOIS. IT WOULD ALSO SEE THE BEGINNING OF BLACK NATIONALISM, A MOVEMENT THAT SOUGHT MORE THAN SOCIOPOLITICAL EQUALITY—IT DEMANDED ECONOMIC POWER.

JAMAICAN-BORN MARCUS GARVEY, FOUNDER OF THE UNIVERSAL NEGRO IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION, AND WALLACE D. FARD, FOUNDER OF THE NATION OF ISLAM, WERE EARLY EXAMPLES OF BLACK NATIONALISTS WHO ESPOUSED RACIAL PRIDE AND EMPHASIZED THE NEED FOR BLACK FINANCIAL INDEPENDENCE.

BLACK NATIONALISTS LIKE GARVEY CHALLENGED THE ESTABLISHED RACIAL STATUS QUO, AND AS A RESULT WERE SEEN AS A THREAT TO AMERICA, ESPECIALLY BY GOVERNMENT AGENCIES LIKE THE BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION (THE PRECURSOR TO THE FBI), WHICH DEPORTED GARVEY IN 1927.

FOR THOSE SEEKING TO KEEP BLACK AMERICANS IN A PLACE OF OPPRESSION AND INFERIORITY, THERE WOULD BE NO DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CIVIL RIGHTS AND BLACK NATIONALISM—BOTH WERE THREATS TO WHITE SUPREMACY.





















LESS THAN SIX MONTHS AFTER THE MURDER OF EMMETT TILL, ROSA PARKS REFUSED TO GIVE UP HER SEAT ON A SEGREGATED BUS IN MONTGOMERY, AL.

THOUGH PARKS'S ACTIONS BECAME THE CATALYST FOR ONE OF THE MOST CRUCIAL MOMENTS OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT--THE MONTGOMERY BUS BOYCOTT--SHE WAS NOT THE FIRST PERSON TO PERFORM THE ACT OF PROTEST ON A BUS.



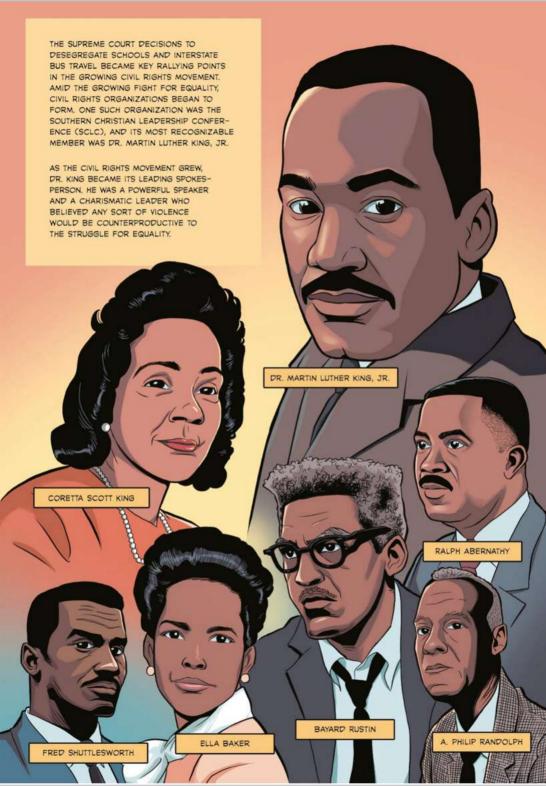
NINE MONTHS BEFORE ROSA PARKS, 15-YEAR-OLD CLAUDETTE COLVIN WAS ARRESTED FOR REFUSING TO GIVE UP HER SEAT IN THE FRONT OF A BUS IN MONTGOMERY. AND NINE YEARS BEFORE THAT, ON JULY 16, 1944, IRENE MORGAN WAS ARRESTED FOR REFUSING TO GIVE UP HER SEAT ON A BUS TRAVELING FROM MARYLAND, WHERE THERE WAS NO SEGREGATION ON BUSES, TO VIRGINIA, WHERE THERE WAS.

MORGAN'S CASE LED TO THE SUPREME COURT DECISION IN MORGAN V. VIRGINIA, WHICH RULED THAT SEGREGATION ON INTERSTATE BUSES WAS UNCONSTITUTIONAL.





ALONG WITH SEGREGATION IN SCHOOLS, SEGREGATION ON BUSES WAS A HUGE PART OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT BECAUSE BOTH ISSUES LED TO COURT RULINGS THAT PROVIDED LEGAL PRECEDENTS FOR DESEGREGATION.





DESPITE THE COMMITMENT TO NONVIOLENCE MADE BY DR. KING AND OTHER MEMBERS OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT, THE RACIST OPPOSITION TO DESEGREGATION DID NOT PRACTICE NONVIOLENCE.

ON SEPTEMBER 15, 1963, MEMBERS OF THE WHITE SUPREMACIST HATE GROUP THE KU KLUX KLAN (KKK) BOMBED THE 16TH STREET BAPTIST CHURCH IN BIRMINGHAM, AL, KILLING 11-YEAR-OLD CAROL DENISE MCNAIR, AND THREE 14-YEAR-OLDS, ADDIE MAE COLLINS, CYNTHIA WESLEY, AND CAROLE ROBERTSON.

NO ONE WAS HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR THE KILLINGS FOR MORE THAN TEN YEARS.

THREE MONTHS BEFORE THE BOMBING OF THE 16th STREET BAPTIST CHURCH, CIVIL RIGHTS LEADER MEDGAR EVERS WAS ASSASSINATED IN FRONT OF HIS HOUSE BY WHITE SUPREMACIST BYRON DE LA BECKWITH.

IT WOULD TAKE MORE THAN 30 YEARS FOR DE LA BECKWITH TO BE CONVICTED OF THE MURDER.





ANDREW GOODMAN, JAMES
CHANEY, AND MICHAEL SCHWERNER
WERE CIVIL RIGHTS ACTIVISTS
WORKING TO REGISTER VOTERS
IN MISSISSIPPI. ALL THREE WERE
KILLED BY A GROUP OF WHITE
SUPREMACISTS ON JUNE 21, 1964.

THEY WERE NOT THE ONLY VICTIMS OF FATAL RACIST ATTACKS. BETWEEN 1955 AND 1968, THERE WERE 41 CIVIL RIGHTS MARTYRS KILLED IN VIOLENT ATTACKS.

IN ADDITION TO THE 41 MARTYRS RECOGNIZED BY THE CIVIL RIGHTS MEMORIAL IN MONTGOMERY, AL, THERE ARE ANOTHER 74 NAMES LISTED OF PEOPLE KILLED IN CONNECTION WITH THE MOVEMENT.

THE VIOLENT OPPOSITION TO CIVIL RIGHTS LED MANY TO QUESTION THE VALIDITY OF NONVIOLENCE. IN THE LATE 1950s, ROBERT F. WILLIAMS FORMED THE BLACK ARMED GUARD IN NORTH CAROLINA, AN ORGANIZATION DEDICATED TO PROTECTING CIVIL RIGHTS ACTIVISTS AGAINST RACIST ATTACKS.

WILLIAMS AND HIS ORGANIZATION TRADED SHOTS WITH THE KKK, AND IN 1961 HE RELOCATED TO CUBA, WHERE HE BROADCAST THE RADIO PROGRAM "RADIO FREE DIXIE" TO THE SOUTHERN UNITED STATES. IN 1962, HE PUBLISHED HIS BOOK, NEGROES WITH GUNS.





IN NOVEMBER 1964, EARNEST "CHILLY WILLY" THOMAS AND FREDERICK DOUGLASS KIRKPATRICK FORMED THE DEACONS FOR DEFENSE AND JUSTICE IN JONESBORO, LA.

WITHIN A YEAR, THERE WOULD BE MORE CHAPTERS OF THE DEACONS IN LOUISIANA, ALABAMA, AND MISSISSIPPI. THE ARMED ORGANIZATION WORKED WITH NONVIOLENT CIVIL RIGHTS GROUPS, PROVIDING SECURITY AT MARCHES AND RALLIES. THE PROTECTION OF THE DEACONS ALLOWED ORGANIZATIONS LIKE THE NAACP TO MAINTAIN THEIR PRACTICE OF NONVIOLENCE.

IN REJECTING NONVIOLENCE, MALCOLM X BECAME ONE OF THE MOST CONTROVERSIAL LEADERS OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS MOVEMENT, FIRST AS A MEMBER OF THE NATION OF ISLAM FROM 1952 TO 1964, AND THEN AS THE FOUNDER OF THE ORGANIZATION OF AFRO-AMERICAN UNITY.

I DON'T FAVOR VIOLENCE.

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BY 1965, AMERICA WAS EMBROILED IN THE VIETNAM WAR. THE U.S. MILITARY WAS NO LONGER SEGREGATED, AND MORE BLACK SOLDIERS SERVED IN VIETNAM THAN ANY OTHER WAR IN AMERICAN HISTORY. NEARLY 25% OF AMERICAN SOLDIERS KILLED IN VIETNAM IN 1965 WERE BLACK.

THE UNPOPULARITY OF THE WAR CONTRIBUTED TO THE POLITICAL TURMOIL IN AMERICA. FOR MANY BLACK AMERICANS, THE WAR IN VIETNAM—A WAR FOR "FREEDOM"—WAS ESPECIALLY PROBLEMATIC, GIVEN THE ONGOING STRUGGLE FOR EQUALITY AND JUSTICE IN THE U.S.
